







Client Demographics

Of the **58 new clients** served this quarter, **more than half were female**. The majority of clients were between the **ages of 25 to 59**. Clients were predominantly **African American (41%)** and **Caucasian (38%)**, with **18%** reporting being Latino and **3%** being Other.











Client Demographics

Of the **108 total clients** served this quarter, **52% presented with more than one type** of victimization.



The most widely reported victimization type experienced by clients served this quarter was Adult Physical Assault (35%). Domestic/Family Violence accounted for 24%, Adult Sexual Assault accounted for 11% and 9% reported some type of abuse during childhood,




Of the 108 total clients served, 33% of them were categorized as special population.




Direct Services

Emotional Support and Safety Services made up **36%** of **total services** this quarter. The team conducted **360 Therapeutic Sessions**, which accounted for **78%** of Emotional Support and Safety Services category. Staff assisted with **Emergency Financial Assistance 78 times** during this quarter.





Intensive Case Management Services including Coordination of Transportation made up the **80%** of the Personal Advocacy category. **Individual Advocacy** provided clients with assistance in applying for public benefits, return of personal property, assistance with doctors appointments, and interventions with employers and landlords.










Project HEAL's Impact

In its first 18 months of operation, Project HEAL served **328 clients** who have engaged in a variety of services. **Personal Advocacy made up the majority of services with 55%**. As noted in previous reports, this is inflated by transportation services, which is an **essential catalyst for support and case management**.



Emotional Support or Safety Services made up **25% of services for clients**. Trauma-informed individual counseling sessions **(1,434)** remain essential to clients in their recovery from multiple incidents of violence. Clients were also provided with **370 instances** of Emergency Financial Assistance, **467 instances** of informing of Victims Rights, **384 Health Screenings** and **359 referrals** to other legal, medical, and faith-based services.
